his year's National Youth Orchestra of Wales will be held at University of Wales, Lampeter from 28th July to 5th August with a concert tour following on from the 6th to the 11th August. The Orchestra - which numbers 116 this year - will perform Arwel Hughes' Prelude for Orchestra, music from Tchaikovsky's Swan Lake Ballet Suite and Mahler's Symphony No.1.

The 'Nash' has debut performances at two



halls this year, the first at the Adrian Boult Hall in Birmingham and the second at the impressive Sage Gateshead concert hall. We hope to build upon the encouraging audience at last year's concert in Birmingham Town Hall with a view to Birmingham becoming a regular fixture in the NYOW summer calendar. We are also joining forces with the National Youth Orchestra of Scotland who perform at The Sage a few days before us; in order to maximise audience numbers and therefore create a fantastic experience for both ensembles we are working together on a joint marketing campaign and offering a joint ticket offer in a unique and encouraging partnership. Whilst in Gateshead we will work with the venue's education department on a joint rehearsal with their 'Young Strings Initiative'; the young players, who age between 9 and 13 will sit alongside members of NYOW in a rehearsal led by our Conductor, Owain Arwel Hughes CBE. It will be a great opportunity for our members to mentor and inspire younger players in a project not dissimilar to our own collaboration with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales.

As well as these exciting concerts the NYOW will also be performing at Aberystwyth Arts Centre, Prichard-Jones Hall Bangor, St David's Hall Cardiff as well as a second invitational appearance at the Three Choirs Festival in Hereford Cathedral. For more details regarding dates and times of the concerts please see the enclosed postcard, and please pass the information on to your friends!

These usually provide half the course fee; however this year two of them will be for the full amount. Bags will be provided for the thirty two new members of the orchestra at a cost of £255 The cost of hiring the parts for Mahler's 1st Symphony will be £1358.

John Hendy holds the record!

his year sees John Hendy achieve a 35 year old association with the Nash. He was a member of the Nash from 1966 – 1969 and has been a tutor from 1979 to the present day.

John started to learn the trombone at Pontypridd Boys Grammar School where the late Haydn Davies was the inspirational music teacher. He has fond memories of playing in the school orchestra and the military band. Haydn was an RAF reservist so the military band also served as the ATC 557 Squadron band.

John attended East Glam orchestra on Saturday mornings and was soon off to Ogmore as a member of the Glamorgan Youth Orchestra. Like so many others he lived for the courses and it was a natural process to audition for the Nash which he joined in 1966.

John remembers the conductor at that time, Arthur Davison as full of energy and totally devoted to the orchestra and its members. He will never forget playing 1st trombone in Brahms 1st symphony and the tricky entry in the last movement "it went OK but was very scary when I was so young!" John attended the Royal Academy of Music from 1967 to 1971. He loved the college and the music but was less enthusiastic about living in London. At college John played in the 1st orchestra

and was also involved in brass ensembles, opera and outside gigs. Contemporaries at the time included James Watson, Mick Thompson, John Smith (of the MU) and Gareth Wood. A year's teacher training at Cyncoed led to a probationer year as a peripatetic teacher in Mid Glamorgan, but John's first love was playing so in 1973 he left teaching to join the Welsh National Opera Orchestra where he has remained. John is one of the three longest serving orchestra members. Asked for his favourite performances over the years his outstanding memory is "Die Frau Ohne Schatten" by Richard Strauss. Close second comes "The Ring Cycle" which was a fantastic experience. WNO Orchestra remains the only orchestra to perform the entire cycle in a week using the same players – apparently most companies use 2 sets of players because it is so strenuous. Harold Nash, who had been a member of the Nash himself, was the trombone tutor when John played in the orchestra. Harold played in the Covent Garden Opera Orchestra and in 1979 Arthur Davison asked John to share tutoring on the Nash with Harold. When Harold bowed out successive trombone players have been fortunate to have John as their tutor. John has given up part of his holiday allocation every year for the Nash and says that he was

fortunate that when he married Lesley she understood that it was a part of his life and never raised any objections. Some of John's section went onto play professionally including Roger Argente who plays with the LPO and Andrew Cresci who plays with the Bournemouth. Matthew Downes is working with the management team at Covent Garden Opera House.

Asked for his favourite Nash memory John says it is putting the world to rights with his great friends and fellow tutors Keith Whitmore, Glyn Parfitt and the late John Bass. And the outstanding orchestra highlights – 2006, when Owain Arwel Hughes conducted the Nash at Hereford Cathedral as part of the Three Choirs Festival. It was the first time that a National Youth Orchestra had played at the Festival and the first time that Mahler 5 had been performed there. The cathedral was packed, the performance outstanding and the audience re-action overwhelming. Two other highlights - Berlin in 2004 and the Glasgow Youth Orchestra Festival in 2000.

Asked to sum up his 35 years with the Nash in a few words John said "the friends I've made and the happy times that I've had".

Long may they continue John!

The Rhondda Symphonietta

A fund raising concert in aid of the Friends of NYOW

hondda Symphonietta was formed seven years ago by Jeff Lloyd. When asked about how the orchestra came to be founded this is what he had to say. "The origins of the Sinfonietta date back tol 2000 when Noreen Harris asked if I could get a small group of players together for a concert to be held in Cardiff in aid of Aberystwyth Former Students As it became an annual fixture I thought we might extend it to embrace other charities/ good causes etc. Consequently, we now perform 3 or 4 concerts per year usually drawing our soloists from within the band itelf.

I have been able to `cherrypick` the players enabling the band to put on a concert following just the one rehearsal on the day.

Three months after my stroke Huw Gareth Williams, then conductor of RSO, asked if I felt up to conducting just one short item, whilst he would look after the bulk of the programme. In the rehearsal, after I'd rehearsed my item, Stu Telling and Brian Clarke sidled over to me with the encouraging words "We've decided that your conducting is just as bad now as it was before your ruddy stroke - so we may as well stick with you!". With such an encourag-

ing endorsement as that how could I fail eh?!"

In September every year, Jeff chooses the repertoire for the coming year and holds a day long rehearsal for his players to familiarise themselves with the music

selves with the music. The orchestra gives three concerts a year and the proceeds are donated to charity. Friends of NYOW were fortunate to receive a generous donation of £415 from the proceeds of a concert given by the Symphonietta at Bethany Chapel in Rhiwbina, Cardiff on the 7th of February 2009. The concert was very well attended and the members of the audience were delighted with the performances of soloists Elin Adams in Cimarosa's oboe concerto and Jo Parkhurst in Bach's A minor Violin Concerto. The rest of the programme contained many delights: a Mozart Divertimento for Strings, Grieg's Holberg Suite, Britten's Simple Symphony and the Elegy and Finale from the Serenade for Strings by Tchaikovsky . The audience demanded an encore and got one: "Spring" from Grieg's Two Elegiac Melodies. Jeff conducted most of the programme but the Cimarosa and Britten were conducted by Andrew Walters.
